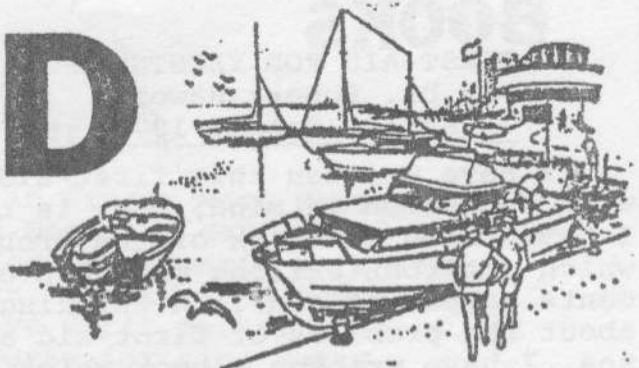

BOATING STUDENT CRUISES

The cruises for Boating students took place October 16, 17, 23, and 24. Commander Barbara Dyck would like to take this opportunity to thank all the boat owners who made their vessels available and also Wolf Fitzau for organizing the cruises.

OCTOBER MEETING

A minute of silence was observed in memory of Dr. John Murray who passed away September 21, 1976.

Lt/C Chuck Wong requested details on any members that might have qualified them for the Pleasure Bent Trophy.

The Christmas Party is planned for December 3.

Lt/C Peter Quartermain reported on training activities: 180 students enrolled in the Boating course, 24 in Seamanship Sail, 17 in Seamanship Power, 20 in Advanced Piloting, 11 in Junior Navigator, 5 in Navigator, 2 in Weather, and 3 in Marine Electronics. Registrations are down somewhat from last year, due in part to the Delta flyers not being distributed. Lt. Harry Fane mentioned he had some extra parallel rules and 5 mm pencils available at cost price.

The Treasurer's report, presented by 1st Lt. John Jones, showed the Squadron to be in sound financial position.

The highlight of the evening was Hal Roth's film on Cruising the Pacific (thanks to the efforts of Marg and Jack Halliday). A very interesting travelogue which was enjoyed immensely by power and sail boaters alike. Those of you who weren't there missed a great film. Coffee and sandwiches concluded the meeting.

BOOKS

FIRST-AID FOR YACHTSMEN

by Dr. Robert Haworth
(Adlard Coles, 1975)

"I have written this first-aid book with yachtsmen in mind; that is to say I have tried to think of the problems which confront sailing men when accidents happen at sea...In thinking about the problems of first-aid at sea, I have written a book which will enable the untrained person to start and complete a treatment without wasting any time."

So says Dr. Robert Haworth, a general practitioner and a crew member of a lifeboat in Wales. In FIRST-AID FOR YACHTSMEN he gives a logical 1, 2, 3, sequence for the immediate treatment of a wide variety of emergencies, followed by advice on the all-important after care required until professional medical help is available.

Besides fractures, dislocations, injuries, illness, pregnancy, and artificial respiration, the book covers movement of casualties and communications in medical emergencies at sea. In addition, Dr. Haworth has recommended a first-aid kit which will enable the first-aider to carry out all the procedures described in this book.

COOKS

SPAGHETTI WITH SCALLOP SAUCE

This is a tasty dinner easily made on a two-burner stove.

You can, of course, substitute fresh oysters or clams.

2 tblsp butter or margarine
½ cup fresh or frozen chopped onion
½ cup chopped celery
2 garlic cloves, minced
1 lb sea scallops, sliced in half
1 15-oz can tomato sauce
2 tblsp chopped parsley
½ tsp salt
4 cups cooked spaghetti
Parmesan cheese for garnish

ABOUT 30 MINUTES BEFORE SERVING:
In 10-inch skillet over medium heat, in hot butter or margarine, cook onion, celery, and garlic until onion is tender, about 5 minutes. Stir in sea scallops, tomato sauce, parsley, and salt; heat to boiling. Reduce heat to low; cover and simmer 5 to 10 minutes until scallops are fork-tender.

Serve sauce over spaghetti; garnish with Parmesan cheese. Makes four servings.

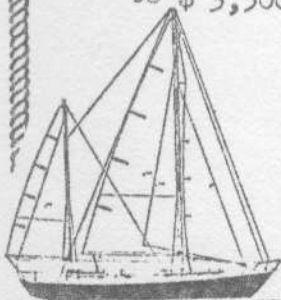
