


There will be a Buffett Dinner featuring Whole Hip of Western Steer and many other good things--leave your diet at home!

CNIB FISHING PROGRAM

The CNIB operates a fishing program from April 1 to September 30 each year. This program is in addition to the Annual CNIB Salmon Derby.

This program has been in existence since 1950. Except for the assistance of a few boat volunteers over the years, the major part of the program is handled by a small group of volunteers who operate the CNIB 18-foot runabout. It is becoming difficult to satisfy the demand using just the one boat.

The CNIB also has a summer lodge on Bowen Island, and their boat is used to carry out water excursions.

A great need exists for volunteers who have cruisers or like boats and who can spare a day or two a month to take out one, two, or three fishermen. Some have their own gear, but others require use of any on board. Some are totally blind, but many have a useful degree of sight.

They are young, middle aged, and elderly, but all have one thing in common-they love being out on the water. If large boats are available, they would organize a mooching group and supply help and bait.

BOOKS

LOW MAN ON A GILL-NETTER by Jospeh P. Tracy (Alaska Northwest Pub. Co., 1974)

The men who go north each spring through the Inside Passage to Alaska to gill net for salmon are a hardy lot. They are stubborn competitors on the fishing grounds; but when it comes to trouble, whether mechanical, human, or wind and weather, they pull together and are the first to come to one another's aid-even at their own expense and peril.

LOW MAN ON A GILL-NETTER recounts
Joseph Tracy's adventures among these
colourful figures on a typical trip
north with the gill-netters' fleet.
Tracy was "low man" on the Dolones S.,
taking his turn at the wheel or at
cooking. But he writes with spice
and verve about the boats and ports
and sea-going characters he encountered on his trip.

The result is a rollicking good tale-and one of the best inside pictures available of daily life with the fishing fleet.

RCMP MARINE WATCH PROGRAM



In an effort to curb the increase in thefts of radio, radars, outboard motors, and other marine accessories, the RCMP has initiated a Marine Watch Program similar to the very successful Neighborhood Watch home burglary prevention program.

The program consists of RCMP officers giving a short talk on how to mark the equipment and then providing the Yacht Club or Marina with engraving pencils to mark radios, sounders, etc; marking pencils to mark equipment such as life jackets; and inventory lists to detail the equipment. After the equipment is marked and listed, the RCMP will come out and check the vessel to ensure everything is correctly marked and has been recorded on the inventory list. Decals are then provided to be fixed

to the equipment and vessel. If a sufficient number of vessels at any particular location participate, large warning signs will be provided at cost for posting at the entrances.

It is suggested that members approach the various yacht clubs or marinas where you are moored and try to generate sufficient interest in this program to get it implemented at your location. Remember, the loss you prevent may be your own.
