On June 8, 1978, 28 year old Macmi James became the first woman to sail single-handedly 'round the Globe via Cape Horn in the fastest time ever.

On Jan. 1, 1979, in recognition of her extraordinary achievement, she became Dame Maomi James, Her award -Communder of the Order of the British Empire.

The book is the author's account of her historic journey. She tells of her despair when the radio fails; of facing months of silence; of the horror of a capsize; of the relentlessness of the elements and ultimately of the fulfillment she experiences at the conclusion of the voyage.

COOKS

TERIYAKI BARBECUED SALMON

cup soy sauce

teaspoon finely minced fresh ginger root

teaspoon sugar

teaspoon saki or sherry (optional) filets of salmon or halibut

Combine marinade ingredients in shallow bowi.

This marinade is enough for two fillets of fish. If you are serving more people, double, or treble the recipe accordingly.)



Marinate the fish for two minutes on each side.

Broil on lightly oiled grill until just firm.

When fish is turned, brush with marinade and again just before serving.

SECOND LOOKS

Permanent fender set-up

Here's a nifty mooring tip from Canadian Power Squadron member Walter Lavey. The system would be invaluable at your permanent berth, forever ending the mad scramble for fenders as you arrive back from a cruise or race. Materials needed are a small cleat (4-in.); length of polypropylene rope; mooring buoy or fishnet float (size of basketball) with ring or loop on one side and a lead weight almost equal to the displacement of the floating marker. Install as you see

Naturally two or more floats like this will be needed (depending on boat size) and the spheres should be adjusted so that the widest part rides at the waterline of your boat. The main advantage is that the buoy will roll easily with the hull, both vertically and horizontally.
