
WELCOME 1980-81 GRADUATES


Highlight of the weekend for the kids was Sunday morning's egg hunt, a well organized event staged by the cutest of bunnies, Esther (pink) and Judy (green).

The Northmen, with help from Brian Smith, kept things moving rhythmically after the installation of Fraser's new bridge.

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

TRAILERING WITH SMALL CARS

The newer small cars will have greatly reduced, if any, capability for towing trailers.

Front wheel drive trains may not be as rugged as the old standard rear wheel drive system, partly because of the need to reduce the weight to achieve light steering. The higher gear ratios of the low gear on the small cars may give deceptively high capability to pull a load up the launching ramp. However, at highway speeds the rapid increase in overall wind resistance may use up most of the engine's power, leaving little reserve for hills or passing. The engine may thus be overloaded to the detriment of its life between major repairs.

Front wheel drives have several obvious advantages on the trailer ramp. The drive train is farther from the water, with less chance of salt water damage. The drive wheels are probably on drier, firmer support, thus getting better traction. The disadvantages are not so obvious but are probably more serious. The slope of the ramp tends to move the car's centre of gravity farther back to decrease the proportion of weight on the front wheels. The result is worsened by the pull of the trailer being applied above the car's axles. The result of these effects is a marked reduction in both tractive effort and braking. It may even be impossible to pull your heavy boat out on to a steep, gravel-surfaced ramp.

The car's braking effect may be inadequate for a relatively heavy trailer, thus making it necessary and expensive to fit brakes to the trailer. This in turn leads to a higher cost for maintaining submerged parts, especially for salt water operation. Light front wheel drive cars usually do not have nice sturdy frames to which to attach trailer hitches. The rear of these cars is relatively light sheet metal with local reinforcing for the rear suspension. This leads to difficult and costly installations if the hitch is to be securely attached. Remember, too, that drilling and welding will locally destroy the original corrosion resistant treatment and coatings. The corrosive attack of salt water splashes and winter road salt will soon play havoc with the thin steel body at the places carrying the towing loads.

The next problem is with guarantees on the car. The manufacturers of several of the most popular small cars disapprove of towing trailers and would, consequently, be likely to use this to void any guarantees or warranties on cars equipped with trailer hitches. At best, the owner would be at the mercy of the dealer in any claims against the car warranty. By their disapproval of towing trailers, the small car manufacturers may avoid product liability in case of a trailering accident. Owners who install non-approved trailer hitches may be drastically increasing the chances of having their gas tanks punctured in the event of a rear ender to the trailer. As always, Buyer Beware.
