

### OPEN MESSAGE TO BOATING STUDENTS

In our last issue we spoke briefly about CPS as an organization, what it was, who it was made up of, membership, and what it might have in it for you. This month I will briefly describe our Squadrons Executive and their functions.

COMMANDER: Elected position.

Is responsible for the proper administration of the affairs of the Squadron and to see that the members conduct themselves in a manner set out in the By-laws of CPS. Governing Board, District and Squad regulations.

The Squad Commander is the ranking officer of the Squadron and is an ex-officio member of all squadron committees.

EXECUTIVE OFFICER: Elected position.

Assists the Commander in the discharge of his duties and takes over in the Commander's absence.

TRAINING OFFICER: Elected position.

Organizes and co-ordinates a committee for carrying out the training program. The committee consists of the Training Officer, Assistant Training Officers, Instructors and Proctors.

ADMINISTRATIVE OFFICER: Elected position.

Provides administrative assistance to other officers.

SECRETARY: Elected Position.

Provides assistance and advice to the Squadron Commander. Keeps files and records.

TREASURER: Elected position.

Looks after the financial end of things.

SUPPLY: Appointed position.

Looks after the course material as well as regalia such as: flags, pennants etc.

PROGRAMS: Appointed position.

Arranges for guest speakers at our social functions.

SOCIAL: Appointed position.

Acts as Master of Ceremonies at our social functions.

MEMBERSHIP: Elected position.

Keeps membership records up to date. Processes new membership applications.

P.R.O. (PUBLIC RELATIONS OFFICER: Elected position.

Arranges for media coverage at our boating courses. Provides Propwash with Squadron activity information.


